In short: We want to give the future of food and research a voice. That is why we are really pleased that the Embassy of Canada is supporting the Global Food Summit in Munich on 20 and 21 March 2019, and is also coming with a large delegation and embassy staff from Berlin," says Stephan Becker-Sonnenschein, founder of the Global Food Summit. "Guelph, for example, is presenting such an innovative and sustainable concept in Munich, and the city has developed a unique concept for the first "Circular Food Economy" worldwide.

The Canadian City of Guelph and adjoining County of Wellington, located in the province of Ontario along Canada's Innovation Corridor, are working with community partners to reimagine the current food system. They have developed a bold vision with ambitious targets to increase access to affordable nutritious food by 50%, create 50 new opportunities for circular business and collaborations, and increase circular economic revenue by 50%. In turn, the 50x50x50 by 2025 goals present an exciting opportunity to develop Canada's first circular food economy. Guelph-Wellington is one of ten finalists vying for \$10M in additional funding in Infrastructure Canada's Smart Cities Challenge.

The Guelph-Wellington area has a rich history in agriculture and is known nationally and internationally as an established technology sector hub and innovator in the agri-food arena. It is one of four cities worldwide studied for its unique contribution to the circular economy approach in a global report recently released by the Ellen MacArthur Foundation.
